Inspired by the 2010 Class Oli, **Aloha Nā 'Ōiwi**, composed by Kumu Kalehua Simeona, the aloha fabric incorporates important symbols representing the class.

Lehua (orange flower) – thrives in very harsh conditions and is usually one of the first plants to sprout after volcanic devastation.

Lama (leaf pattern) – a tree for which Kapālama is named and a grove wherein ali'i were trained. The leaves of the tree provides protection for the plants growing beneath its protection.

Kaiona (abstract bird) – a name by which Pauahi was referred. Kaiona is the goddess of Ka'ala who would send birds to assist lost travelers.

One hānau (sand colored tones) – “sands of birth” binding the members of the Class of 2010.
